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

Work for the Salvation of Souls

In the parable of Lazarus and the rich man Jesus paints a dramatic scene of contrasts -- riches and poverty, heaven and hell, compassion and indifference, inclusion and exclusion. We also see an abrupt and dramatic reversal of fortune. The story centers on the reversals of fortune that takes place after Lazarus and the rich man die. It links agony or comfort after death with how we treat the less fortunate around us, much like the Gospel of Matthew links eternal life and punishment with how we treat the hungry and thirsty, strangers, the naked, the sick, and those in prison. This reversal after death is ultimate. An unbridgeable chasm exists between Lazarus at Abraham's side and the rich man in Hades. Luke, in particular, stresses the way the status of the rich and the poor is reversed in the kingdom of God. When Jesus is conceived in Mary's womb, she exults that the hungry have been filled and the rich sent away empty. In the Sermon on the Plain, Jesus tells the poor that God favors them and that the kingdom of God belongs to them, but he warns the rich of what is to come since they have already received their consolation in this life. Luke makes clear that the poor are a focus of Jesus' ministry. In his inaugural sermon, Jesus

declares that he has been anointed by the Spirit of the Lord "to bring good news to the poor." Two weeks ago in the Sunday reading, we heard that Jesus admonishes His followers not just to invite to their parties the friends and neighbors who can repay them, but to extend their invitations to "the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind."

We live in a world today where a lot of Christians' emphasis is on personal salvation ("saving my soul") and that is achieved by being a morally good person. "Morally good" means avoiding actions which are ethically wrong, such as, failing to worship God in the "official" way, committing violent actions against others, behaving in a sexually immoral way, stealing things from people, gossiping maliciously about others, being jealous, envious, angry, resentful... and so on. As long as I am not aware of doing any of these things, or at least, not doing them in a serious way ("mortal sin"), then I am a "good" person. However, this is not really the picture that the Gospel today describes. If we were to base our judgments on the above image of the "good Catholic," then there was really nothing much wrong with the rich man in the gospel story. All he did was to enjoy his wealth and his good

food, his big house, his fashionable and expensive clothes. He did not seem to do any harm to the poor man. He did not drive him away or use abusive language towards him. We have no idea how the rich man became rich. Perhaps he was born into a rich family and inherited his wealth; perhaps it was the result of working long hours over many years. Why should such a man be punished? And, even more strangely, why should the beggar be rewarded? Dear friends, that rich man in the parable may have worked very hard to get his money, perhaps he was a good family man who loved his wife and was a good father to his children. Perhaps he went faithfully to the synagogue every Sabbath and observed all the regulations of the Sabbath day. He may have been seen as a very pillar of his community. Yet Our Lord tells us as long as that poor man lay uncared for at his feet, the rich man was totally condemned.

As an individual in our society, you and I may not (yet) be regarded as rich. We are living in a society where wealth is very unevenly divided. There are many social problems in our midst affecting both rich and poor. The poor become poorer because of their laziness or bad life too. Every social problem is a form of deprivation, a denial of full human living. How aware am I of these problems? How aware am I that I am somehow responsible for their elimination? What, in practice, am I contributing to the removal of these problems? What am I doing practically to support the uplifting of the poor. In the Gospel we see the rich man made the excuse (when it was too late) that he did not realize what was going on. His brothers (also rich?) did not realize it either. Let them be warned, he pleaded. Even in hell, the rich man could still only think of his own family, he was too self-centered: he does not think he is responsible for the salvation of other people.

Dear brothers and sisters, God's eternal judgment has everything to do with how we use wealth in this world, the message has been clearly stated. Like the rich man's five brothers, we have all been given the warning we need, there is nothing wrong with enjoying the fruit of our hard work but do not neglect the poor who are in need of our support. ☞
